CITY OF NAPERVILLE LEAF COLLECTION 2019

The city bulk curbside leaf collection program for 2019 will include 3 neighborhood pick up cycle dates on October 21, November 4 and November 18. Rake leaves into street next to curb in front of house at the start of each cycle. Snow, rain, or freezing weather

may delay or permanently halt the curbside collection. Leaves and yard waste may be disposed using 32-

gallon paper yard waste bags, clearly labeled 32gallon trash cans or clearly labeled two-wheeled carts. Prior to November 4, yard waste stickers are required for a bag, bundle or container.

From November 4, through December 13, 2019, the City offers free collection of leaf and yard waste in bags and containers without stickers for pick up on our regular trash day.

The bagged leaf and yard waste collection program will end on December 13, 2019.

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School Bus Rules for Stopping

Classes are now in session around Illinois as a new school year gets under way. That means drivers need to remember to follow a few rules of the road. Forgetting those rules — and being caught doing so — could carry stiff penalties for motorists or, even worse, cause a serious accident.

Per the NHTSA (National Highway Traffic Safety Administration), the school bus is the safest vehicle on the road. However, the most dangerous part of the bus ride is the bus stop. Kids can dart out across the road or unexpectedly walk out from the back of the bus and drivers need to be careful!



SCHOOL BUSES WITH OVERHEAD Red and Yellow Lights (With or Without Bus Stop Signs)

- Yellow lights are flashing: Prepare to stop.
- Red lights are flashing: Stop no closer than 20 feet from bus.
- Red lights turned off: Proceed.

1. Dogs must be on a leash


Pets are to be controlled and held securely on a leash.

Please be respectful to your neighbors and dispose of your pet's waste in your own bin or a public bin at the park. Noone wants someone else's dog poop in their trash bin.



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
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HEALTHY LUNCHES FOR OUR KIDS

There are many websites that give great ideas for creative and healthy packable school lunches. A good healthy lunch is an essential learning tool for our children. Keep them fueled during the day with the most nutritious foods, and they will be able to do their best in everything they encounter.

 Arm yourself with the right supplies — An insulated lunch bag/pack, small ice packs, insulated stainless steel thermos and reusable containers.
